#### 1.1 Activity Description/Introduction

Verité Research (VR), in partnership with the International Research and Exchanges Board (IREX) and United Stated Agency for International Development (USAID), commenced work in May 2018 on the role played by the Sinhala and Tamil print media in areas of transitional justice, reconciliation and minority/women's issues in Sri Lanka. For this purpose, two activities were outlined: (1) quarterly reports, and (2) a public senti-meter analysis.

Activity (I) focused on producing quarterly reports that analyse the treatment of public issues by the Sinhala and Tamil press. Meanwhile, activity (2) focused on developing a web platform to visually illustrate polarised reportage between the Sinhala and Tamil press. In featuring these issues on a web platform, the team hoped to cultivate online discussions and organically initiate and encourage the print media to promote responsible and ethical reporting.

#### 2. IMPLEMENTATAION PROGRESS

#### 2.1 Progress Narrative

The implementation progress is detailed under the specific activities carried out by the team: (1) quarterly reports and (2) a public senti-meter analysis.

#### (I) Quarterly Reports

VR published a total of four quarterly reports that analysed the polarity of coverage of a key issue in the Sinhala and Tamil press. The issues that were analysed were selected in consultation with IREX. VR oversaw the coding, monitoring and summarising of the relevant newspaper articles as well as the overall analysis and publication of the reports. The four reports published by VR are chronologically listed below:

- i. Media and Reconciliation: Media Coverage of the Office on Missing Persons and the Devolution of Power submitted on 12 September 2018
- ii. Media and Reconciliation: Media Coverage of the Political Situation in Sri Lanka in relation to Minorities submitted on 14 December 2018
- iii. Media and Reconciliation Press Coverage on The Drafting of a New Constitution during the Tenure of the Yahapaalanaya Government submitted on 11 March 2019
- iv. Media and Reconciliation: Press Coverage on Sri Lanka's Progress as Outlined during the 40th Session of the UNHRC submitted on 23 May 2019

Each report provided quantitative and qualitative insights into the issue selected for analysis. The reports also included findings from VR's platform, Ethics Eye whenever relevant and applicable to the issue selected for analysis. Following the submission of each report, IREX provided feedback which was incorporated by VR to publish revised editions of the reports. IREX also conducted

two media salons to publicly discuss the findings of the report. These media salons were attended by journalists, students interested in local media and the VR team. VR also participated in the panel discussions at these media salons.

#### (2) Public senti-meter analysis

The public senti-meter analysis, also known as The Divide, was launched on 07 February 2019. The initial launch for the year 2018 was postponed mainly due to the time taken by VR and IREX to reach an agreement on a common vision and visual layout for The Divide (also see section 2.1). At the meeting held on 06 February 2019, VR and IREX agreed that VR would oversee the design and analytical content of The Divide to mitigate further communication delays and proceed with the launch.

In the last four months since its launch, The Divide has managed to create a sizeable societal impact and gain positive traction for its trilingual, insightful content. Currently, The Divide has 30 posts that are accessible in English, Sinhala and Tamil. The site primarily publishes succinct, analytical write-ups (see annexure). These posts illustrate the split in attention between the Sinhala and Tamil press. For instance, on 18 May 2019, the Sinhala front page headings focused on commemorating the 'war heroes', while the Tamil front page headings gave prominence to the Mullivaikkal commemoration. The team also published a pictorial analysis of the imagery featured in the Sinhala and Tamil press to commemorate ten years since the end of Sri Lanka's armed conflict. The team hopes to branch into newer areas of identifying the divide in press reporting such as cartoons in the Sinhala and Tamil press.

The content published on The Divide was shared on social media via VR's Twitter and Facebook pages to strengthen public discourse by disseminating information. These posts received significant traction and were liked/shared by prominent journalists (e.g. Nalaka Gunewardena and Amantha Perera), state and political figures (e.g. Gajendrakumar Ponnambalam and Sudarshana Gunawardena), researchers (e.g. Sanjana Hattotuwa and Shamara Wettimuny), organisations/citizen media (e.g. MinorMatters, Groundviews, Maatram, International Truth and Justice Project, Global Tamil Forum and Pearl Action).

#### 2.2 Implementation Status

- Quarterly Reports VR submitted the four quarterly reports on issues covered in the Sinhala and Tamil press. These issues were selected in consultation with IREX. The continuation of coding, monitoring and analysis for the report is subject to agreement between VR and IREX in the new contract.
- The Divide As per the initial scope of work, VR agreed to publish content that was relevant and available for a period of 45 weeks per year. This was provided that the website launched before 30 November 2018. However, as the website was launched on 07 February 2019, VR and IREX agreed to revisit the quarterly targets. Following the launch, The Divide received significant online traction and has managed to be a site of public interest. VR is currently managing the website by posting trilingual content.

#### 2.1 Implementation Challenges

• The Divide – The development of the website became a lengthier and costlier process than the team initially anticipated. This was due to (I) logistical issues and (2) backdrop during the date agreed for the launch.

#### (I) Logistical issues

- (i) Design The website was subject to three overall design phases in light of the feedback provided by IREX at different stages of development (second design change requested on 06 November 2018 and third design change requested on 06 December 2018). While the team appreciated the feedback provided, the incorporation of these changes made it difficult for the team to launch the website in 2018 since a section of the team was also working on the quarterly reports and since the changes proposed required time and resources to change the website's design
- (ii) Proactive disclosure The launch of the website was withheld until USAID responded on the proactive disclose.

#### (2) Backdrop during the date agreed for the launch

- (i) Launch of Budget Promises and the Media Ownership Monitor Sri Lanka (MOMSL) VR conveyed that public attention would be split between the launch of two of its initiatives, Budget Promises and MOM. As such, VR requested for the website to be launched following these two initiatives to generate better public traction onto the website. However, VR posted the teasers for the website during this time period in preparation for the launch.
- (ii) Crisis that happened on 26 October in 2018 In light of the crisis that took place in Sri Lanka in October, IREX discussed the need to revisit strategies for the launch. The need to revisit strategies, coupled with the

incorporation of feedback provided by IREX, led to revising the date selected for launch.

While the website has achieved several successes during the past few months following the launch, the above issues made it difficult for the team to utilise financial and time-based allocations efficiently. The team felt it may have been beneficial to outsource the development of the website to a web designing company and focus the team's resources on generating analytical content. The feedback VR got from IREX on a number of times on the site which resulted in revising the site several times had not been factored in with regard to time, resources and finances on the site.

 Quarterly reports – The issues selected by VR and IREX for the series of quarterly reports proved to be timely topics of discussion in the public sphere. However, the high volume of press content, was challenging for the team to manage on a weekly basis and meet the date of delivery. Nevertheless, the team worked towards providing an insightful report for each quarter.

# 3. INTEGRATION OF CROSSCUTTING ISSUES AND FORWARD PRIORITIES

#### 3.1 Sustainability Mechanisms

The sustainability of The Divide is currently subject to financial support as the contracted period ended on 15 May 2019. VR is managing The Divide and generating content to maintain the site's transformative impact in society. Financial support from IREX is crucial in terms of sustaining the site for a significant period of time. Thus, supporting the site at least for four consecutive years will help VR to achieve the goals of The Divide.

#### 3.2 Policy and Governance Support

This section is beyond the scope of work outlined in the Terms of Reference (ToR). However, The Divide was utilised to organically foster public conversations on social media about polarised reporting in the Sinhala and Tamil press. Moreover, the findings in the quarterly reports were used by IREX to promote responsible reporting by holding media salons. VR also attended and participated in these discussions.

#### 3.3 Local Capacity Development

As outlined in section 3.2, The Divide served to create public conversations on social media about polarised reporting in the Sinhala and Tamil press. Content analysed on The Divide was shared and liked on social media platforms by prominent media personnel, researchers and political figures.

IREX conducted two media salons based on the findings of the quarterly reports to promote responsible and ethical reporting. These salons were attended by media personnel and university students interested in the local media. VR also participated in the panel discussions at these salons.

# 4. STAKEHOLDER PARTICIPATION AND INVOLVEMENT

As mentioned in the previous sections, VR participated in media salons conducted by IREX. The Divide was used to generate online conversations on topics of national significance.

#### 5. LESSON LEARNED

- I. Using the expertise of a web development company may have helped to fasten the launch of the website while the team focused on the research and analytical content required for the site. Changes that had to be made on the site based on frequent feedback slowed down the launch which could have been avoided by outsourcing the site development or by going ahead with a simpler version of the site so that changes could have been made as we were going ahead with uploading of the site.
- 2. Topics of national significance in the Sinhala and Tamil press resulted in the team having to process a high volume of content that was not previously anticipated.

#### 6. PLANNED ACTIVITIES FOR YEAR TWO


